OUR VISION & MISSION

Women's Global Education Project envisions a world where all women and girls have the power to lead healthy, happy, and safe lives within supportive communities, thereby creating a better world for all. To achieve this, we establish highly effective local partnerships that empower women and girls through programs focused on education, literacy, leadership, bodily rights protection, reproductive health, and supportive environments.

Since our founding in 2004, we have grown from a scholarship program assisting 12 needy girls in rural Senegal to attend school for the first time, to an internationally recognized and award-winning organization. Today, WGEP has helped over 50,000 girls, boys, and women in rural Senegal and Kenya graduate from high school and university, learn to read, and develop the leadership skills necessary to become the change-makers of tomorrow.



OUR PROGRAMS

We believe that complex problems require multi-sectoral solutions. We operate three complementary programs that aim to dismantle the structural barriers that keep girls from attending and succeeding in school: Sisters to School, Our Sisters Read, and Our Sisters Lead.



Sisters to School is our flagship program in Kenya and Senegal that targets the barriers preventing girls from attending school. WGEP provides scholarships for primary school through university, school supplies, health education workshops on reproductive health, personal hygiene, and the dangers of female genital mutilation (FGM/C). The program also includes after school clubs for boys and girls promoting gender equality, and regular parent support and community engagement meetings. In 2023, WGEP supported 1,185 girls in Kenya and Senegal with scholarships.



Our Sisters Read (OSR) promotes and expands foundational reading and literacy skills for primary school students with support from USAID. OSR provides tutoring and books to students struggling to read. The program further provides adult literacy classes and teacher training to complement school-based activities and sustain impact over time. In 2023, WGEP broke ground on a first-of-its-kind library in Tharaka-Nithi Kenya, hosted 1,159 adults in literacy courses, and offered remedial reading support for over 300 third graders struggling to read.



Our Sisters Lead fosters and promotes key leadership skills of young emerging leaders through workshops on public speaking, conflict resolution, and advocacy. The program also supports these young leaders in designing their own community development projects to engage the greater community around topics of importance to them. In 2023, 316 girls and 60 boys participated and 3,300 community members attended events organized by leaders on topics like child marriage and gender-based violence.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

New Partnership in Kenya: Hope for Girls @ VISA

In 2023, WGEP established a new partnership with Hope for Girls @ VISA (HFGV). Based in Migori County, Kenya, the organization is dedicated to rescuing girls from the dangers of FGM and empowering them with education and life skills. WGEP supports HFGV in providing scholarships and Alternative Rite of Passage (ARP) programming to local girls. The scholarship program covers the cost of attending school, while ARP ensures that girls are protected from FGM, and receive information on reproductive health, the importance of education, good hygiene practices, nutrition, empowerment, healthy relationships, and human rights.

UN Commission on the Status of Women Forum

In March 2023, welcomed two of our Senegal-based team members, Program Director Yvette Penda Senghor and Program Coordinator Mbathiou Diouf, who traveled to New York and Chicago on a 12-day trip to attend the United Nations' Commission on the Status of Women (CSW67) Forum. Here, Yvette and Mbathiou met with delegates from other Francophone countries to discuss increasing women's access to digital tools, and led a luncheon of girls education advocates.





PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Movement Maker Trip to Kenya

WGEP successfully closed out our \$1 million Movement Maker Campaign with a celebratory trip to visit partner Tharaka Women's Welfare Project in June 2023. WGEP supporters had the chance to visit Kenya, and meet with program participants to better understand the impact of WGEP's work, and the challenges that girls still face in this region.

Senegal's Leadership Program Continues to Grow

Our Sisters Lead equips emerging leaders with skills like public speaking and advocacy, while encouraging them to design and implement community projects. In 2023, over 8,000 community members attended the meetings and conversations led by these changemakers, and radio broadcasts hosted by leaders reached an audience of over 500,000 listeners. The themes covered during these activities included preventing gender-based violence, reproductive health, sustainability, and drug and alcohol abuse.

Ground breaking on the WGEP Library

In December 2023, WGEP broke ground on the Women's Global Education Project Library and Computer Center in Tharaka-Nithi, Kenya. Upon completion in 2024, the center will be the first public library in the county, serving to improve the reading and digital literacy skills of 10,000 women, girls, and community members, expanding access to literacy and reading materials in the region.

Fatoumata is a recent high school graduate who participated in WGEP's Sisters to School program beginning in 2019. Here she shares some of the challenges she faced in attending school and what attending school has meant to her.

"This year, WGEP encouraged me and motivated me which made my exams easy. The meetings with the counseling psychologists allowed me to release the pain that prevented me from working and focusing well and also gave me information on the different types of violence against women, and awakened me from certain ignorance. I endured a lot of problems but it is thanks to Women's Global's support that I became strong.

"WGEP changed my life. I could never thank the program enough. I had planned to drop out of school to go work in Dakar to help my parents, but after graduation the program continued to help me register for university. I thank the whole team who helped us. Long live the Sisters to School program!"




