### **Letter from the Executive Director**

#### Dear Friends,

This past year has truly been remarkable for women's rights and girls' education. From the popularity of the PBS documentary <code>Half the Sky</code>—to the mainstream success of the documentary film <code>Girl Rising</code>—to men and boys in rural Senegal and Kenya coming out in support of our programs, there is increasing awareness that education for girls can change the world.

At Women's Global Education Project, we are proud to be part of that change, and proud that you have chosen to support us in this endeavor!

Within the past six months, I had the opportunity to visit both WGEP Senegal and Kenya programs, and I was inspired and humbled by how our amazing girls are changing their world: In Kenya I was able to walk hand-in-hand with 263 brave young women as they publicly took a stand against the practice of female genital mutilation in their communities. In Senegal, I talked with several girls who joined our program in the early days and are now getting ready to enter high school or graduate—bucking the high dropout rates for girls that still plague rural communities there. This kind of impact is only possible because of your steadfast support over the years.

Your generosity has made it possible for WGEP to help more than 700 girls go to school—girls who are defying the prediction that growing up in poverty + their gender puts them at the greatest risk of reaching adulthood without education. Your help makes a different life possible for them.

## **Impacting Girls in School**

### THE NEED:

61 million school-aged kids out of school around the world; half live in sub-Saharan Africa, more than half are girls.

**— UNESCO** 

WGEP provides scholarships and support to girls who would otherwise not have the chance for an education, focusing on marginalized rural areas which tend to fall through the cracks of larger government and NGO initiatives.

### THE WGEP IMPACT

- More than 700 girls in school via WGEP scholarships
- Nearly 3,000 WGEP scholarships given to date
- WGEP programs reach 58 schools and 65 villages in rural Senegal and Kenya

# **Meet Aliana**

Meet Aliana, a very bright and passionate young woman whose family would not have been able to afford to send her to secondary school had it not been for our WGEP Kenya program. Aliana was in our program for four years, excelling in school and graduating. She wanted to go further in her studies but could not afford post-secondary schooling. WGEP Kenya Project Coordinator Aniceta Kiriga helped Aliana apply for and get a scholarship to attend the

Kenya Institution of Studies and Criminal Justice in Meru. Aliana is now studying social work and community development.

"I've really been empowered by our program," Aliana says. "I want to help people overcome their poverty levels. By sharing knowledge, we can improve our living standards."



# **Meet Safora**

WGEP Senegal scholar Safora has always been a trailblazer. Nearly 10 years ago, she became the first in her family of 12 children to go to school when she joined our Sisters-to-School program. She is a dedicated student who does well in school and earns top grades, and the program provides her with the support she needs to do her best in school. "I want to make a better life for myself and my family," she says.

Not only did Safora complete primary school, but she is now—against all

the odds stacked against girls in rural villages like hers—about to complete middle school and enter high school.

Safora personally knows the power that education has to change lives, and she wants to make sure other girls in her village have the same chance she has. In addition to her school work, she is now tutoring a WGEP primary school scholar.

# **Impacting Retention**

### THE NEED:

Less than half of girls in sub-Saharan Africa complete primary school. The average "school life expectancy" for girls in poor, rural regions of Africa is just 1.9 years.

WGEP's multi-tiered strategy for improving retention helps scholars succeed in school and have the support they need as trailblazers in communities where girls continue to be at high risk for dropping out. We provide tutoring and mentoring support, family outreach, and lending libraries for textbooks, and help communities address practices such as genital cutting and early marriage that contribute to high dropout rates for girls.

### THE WGEP IMPACT

- 278 girls in academic tutoring program
- · 400 girls in mentoring program
- 90% and above retention rate among WGEP scholars over the past five years

## **Impacting Attitudes**

### THE NEED:

WGEP believes family and community buy-in to be essential not only to our scholars' success, but also to the sustainability and longevity of our programs and impact. We work with parents, siblings, extended family, neighbors, friends, educators, and community leaders to help them be champions in their communities for women and girls.

### Family Support

Meet Awa. Awa's niece lived in a village that didn't have a school. Awa took her in to live with her family so that her niece, a WGEP Senegal scholar, could continue her education at Awa's village school. "It's important my niece learns," Awa says. "I never got the chance to go to school, but I hope she has a better life."



### **Male Support**

In the patriarchal villages where many of our scholars live, the support of male leaders and role models goes a long way in changing long standing attitudes on educating women and girls. Here, a male trainer participates in our Alternative Rite of Passage program, publicly throwing his support behind the fight against female genital cutting in his community.



### **Community Support**

Senegal community radio "Radio Niombato 91.1 FM," based in the Fatick region where we work, has been broadcasting our program activities! Radio Niombato is widely listened to in Fatick, which means the WGEP message is reaching more and more people in the surrounding villages.













# Impacting Female Genital Cutting'

In December 2012, WGEP Executive Director Amy Maglio joined 263 girls in Tharaka, Kenya, for our annual Alternative Rite of Passage (ARP) program to support the girls and their families as they publicly said "No!" to genital cutting.


