Over the past year, 3,500 students have taken part in our program. It has been encouraging to see the lines of students outside our local office waiting to check out books. For most of these students, it is the first time they have ever checked out a book from a library!

Your continued support and passion has made it possible for WGEP to help over 1,000 girls go to school and thousands of students engage in reading activities while cultivating a community that supports and nurtures education. I am honored to be part of such an impactful initiative and to work with you to achieve these results.

ENGAGING YOUNG MEN TO ADVANCE WOMEN'S RIGHTS



Begun in 2013, the Safe Male Circumcision program advocates for the eradication of FGM while providing young men with a safe transition into adulthood. Young men are educated on health and gender issues throughout the year and publicly support their sisters, cousins and friends in standing up against FGM. WGEP and our partner TWWP understand that young men's participation and support is vital to the success of gender equality and to generating lasting change.

Safe Male Circumcision

- 58 boys took part in the program, up from 32 participants in 2013
- 1,957 community members instructed on safer methods for boys' circumcision and on the harms of FGM

Leading the Fight Against FGM

- WGEP partner and TWWP Director Aniceta Kiriga recognized for her leadership efforts to eradicate FGM with a Kenya Presidential Award from the National Gender and Equality Commission
- TWWP Program Assistant Rael Wanja recognized as a 2014 Girl Child
 Crusader for Tharaka Nithi County and as a 2013 Human Rights Crusader
- This recognition is evidence of the positive and lasting change our programs and partners are making in the region as well as of the wider support we are generating for girls' rights and education.

Lasting Change

- More young men now find it acceptable to marry an uncut young woman
- WGEP and TWWP sought out for guidance on general family matters, health concerns and counseling for survivors of abuse

OUR SISTERS READ

Women's Global Education Project believes that literacy is the basis for all educational opportunities. Children who have a strong foundation of literacy skills are more likely to succeed throughout their education, break the cycle of poverty and be better equipped to realize their full potential. However, the statistics on literacy are disheartening: 40% of young people in Sub-Saharan Africa are illiterate and 38% of African adults are illiterate, two-thirds of which are women (Education for All Global Monitoring Report 2013 and UNESCO).

To address these challenges, WGEP is partnering with USAID to improve literacy in Senegal's rural Fatik region through the Our Sisters Read program. This 4-year program will increase students' access to books and technology through libraries, computer labs and mobile libraries. With its innovative model for engaging students in reading and learning, Our Sisters Read has already reached 3,500 students through reading competitions, games, and working with tablets.

The program will ultimately engage 7,000 Senegalese students from 52 schools in the Fatik region, providing fun and engaging literacy activities that encourage students and instill in them a lifelong love of reading and learning.

READING COMPETITIONS HIGHLIGHT LITERACY SKILLS

In order to raise awareness of and increase enthusiasm for literacy, reading and writing competitions are held regularly at a community center in Sokone. At a recent award ceremony, 12-year-old Fallou, an *Our Sisters Read* scholar who was illiterate at the beginning of the school year won first prize! Fallou received literacy tutoring all year through the USAID-funded *Our Sisters Read* literacy program and now has the skills needed to reach his fullest potential in school and beyond.

Over 650 people attended the awards ceremony, including local dignitaries, a delegation from USAID, parents, students and school directors. The popularity of this event demonstrates the immense and far-reaching impact our program is having on the communities in the Fatik region of Senegal. We could not do this vital work without your support! On behalf of Fallou and all our *Sisters to School* and *Our Sisters Read* scholars, we thank you!

SENEGAL

Aminata: I was born and raised in a rural fishing town on Senegal's eastern coast. My parents were illiterate subsistence farmers and lacked the means to provide me with school supplies, fees and any extra academic support. I had a hard time doing my homework and doing well on tests. I felt that I was working so hard and fighting everyday just to fail. But then Sisters to School came along and provided me with what I greatly needed: tutoring. With the tutoring provided through the program, I was able to pass key exams and move my education forward.

I became the first person in my family to receive a formal education and graduate high school! I was fortunate again because WGEP and partner Femmes Plus made me an outreach officer for the Our Sisters Read program. I am very happy to be working with the program because I am passionate about literacy and education. I love working with students and seeing their budding love for reading.

My favorite book is "So Long a Letter" by Mariama Ba because it speaks of the realities of Senegalese society, but also because the author is a true female fighter and my idol. She sacrificed her entire life to succeed and help her family. For me, education is the essence of all of human life and reading is the gateway to wisdom.

Kambe: Kambe has been a WGEP Sisters to School scholar for three years and is currently in her final year of high school in Sokone. She lives with one of her older sisters so that she can attend high school there; her parents' village where she grew up is too far from her school.

Kambe was surprised at what a huge difference the scholarship has made in her life. Prior to receiving the scholarship, her family lived in very difficult conditions. They would go out into the fields after the millet harvest and collect whatever was left so they could sell it in the local market to have enough money to purchase school supplies. Kambe is the fourth of five children and only her and her youngest sister attend school. One of her older sisters went to Dakar to work as a maid in order to make money to send home to her family. All of Kambe's other siblings, except for the youngest, have married and dropped out of school.

Kambe's mother is very supportive of her daughters' education and herself takes adult literacy classes through Sisters to School in order to learn to read and support her daughters in school.

Kambe wants to continue her studies after she passes her final high school exam. Her favorite subjects are English and French. Her favorite activities include reading and helping to prepare tea for her family and guests. After years of toiling in the fields, Kambe would like to work in an office as a manager upon receiving her college degree.

After graduating and passing my final exam, I now have a job! I am working at Gatue Secondary School as the secretary, working toward my mission of being an accountant.


